Dear Saigdai,

(May I have out the "Mr", and will you do so in return?). Thank you for your letter. Yes, of course I will try and write a few lines on the book, and have already asked Bent to do so. I shall not have time to try my hand at it before sailing (the 15th) but will do what I can on the boat - also try and put Father Davies to work!

It will be sad to leave India in spite of the absolute necessity for rest. In many ways I feel I have struck roots here, and met kindred souls (your expression). Certainly the stirring that has most struck me here has my whole-hearted sympathy. And certainly, too, the social and educational currents I have found here seem to me part of a world-unraveling current. Our interests, aims and troubles are common, that is perhaps the strongest impression I carry with me.

The Bombay meeting was, I think, the best we have had anywhere (you see, I was not at Aligarh!). We visited Gandhiji and, although I was prepared to find a figure that inspired reverence and devotion, I was not prepared for the immediate ~~to~~ lovability that would have knocked down all my defenses, had I had any - as I had now, I was moved almost to tears, and would have been prepared to eat a crocodile to give him the tiniest satisfaction. He looked

well to a layman, and spoke most delightfully about his scheme.  
I hope we didn't tire him — he was talking most of the time.

We also had a talk with Mr. Kher, whom I liked very much, and who volunteered to join the NEF section and lend it the support of his name. Meenan, the organising secretary in Bombay (or one of them), seems to me a very good man for the post of secretary of the whole movement in India. You remember us discussed him in Calcutta. Let us keep in touch in the future. I do hope the NEF Indian committee gets going in earnest.
